Party Time is coming...

Lake Macquarie opens up for The Season of Sail By VC Rye UK

The entrance to Lake Macquarie has been dredged and the beautiful sailing ground is now open to welcome visitors for the Season of Sail.

When I last spoke to Geoff King, VC of No Particular Harbour, the fate of the whole event was on a knife edge, as two tragic accidents had delayed the dredging. And with no dredging, Lake Macquarie was pretty well land locked. And further complicating things is confusion of where the responsibility for dredging lies.

But, for the past few weeks, the dredger has been busy and there is presently $2.4\mbox{m}$

water at low water Swan Bay, with 1.9m near the port (red) marker and 1.6m near the starboard (green marker). Geoff reminds skippers that high tide at Swan Bay is around 2.hrs 30 mins after Swansea Heads. He also advises skippers to watch out for later updates.

The welcome lunch on May 23rd is now fully booked (as COVID restrictions apply). Those attending should anchor near F jetty or at Styles Point. A special menu has been prepared to speed up service and there will be entertainment after the meal.

If you haven't booked, you are still very welcome to join in the cruise around the lake on May 24th and May 25th. Which is for Shaggers and members of the LMYC Cruising division. For further information, contact Geoff King svbluegrass@gmail.com or ring him on 0415181290.

The Rainbow Serpent By VC Rye



Indigenous Australians believe the Rainbow Serpent descended from the stars as the creator of life and protector of the land and its people. She is known by many names and in North Queensland she is "Yaminda" and inhabits the water and reveals herself as a rainbow as she moves across the Earth shaping landscapes. The Ngaro people of the Whitsundays believe those islands were created when Yaminda chose this beautiful stretch of Queensland to lay her eggs, close to the shore.

Carolyn and John Martin bought their sailing catamaran in 2017 from the original owner David Burke (VC Rattlesnake Island) who had been inspired by the magic of the tale to name her after the Rainbow Serpent 'Yaminda'. It must have been a bit of magic and good luck finding Yaminda, because Carolyn says they had never really thought about owning a sailing boat, rather a caravan for future travels.

They live on a 150 acre property at Seaforth, and both enjoy land bound hobbies: John in his men's den shed and Carolyn making glass beads - neither of which transpose to the ocean.

With retirement getting closer on the horizon, they didn't have dreams of abandoning the fishing boat or ski boats, or comforts of home. But then.... was it the advertisement for an 'investment' in Charter or going to their first Rendezvous at Shag Islet in 2016 on their 7.3m power cat "Evelyn Rose" that changed it all?

Excitement is mounting now as they recently delivered Yaminda, their Seawind 1160 Cat, back to the Whitsundays for the very last time. Since new in 2010, the Cat has been in charter with Charter Yachts Australia. Each year, during the 'quiet' season, John (VC Hammer Island) and Carolyn have sailed her home to Mackay to carry out annual maintenance, engine services and a long list of jobs. This year they have done nearly all the work themselves. The next time they board her in December 2021, it will be to start the greatest adventure yet - their sailing retirement.

With plans to take things slow to begin with, they expect to spend time on the East Coast, between Sydney and Lake Macquarie, the Whitsundays and north to Cairns. Gradually they plan to get Yaminda up to spec for blue water sailing, so they can join rallies to the Louisiades, PNG and maybe New Caledonia/Vanuatu. Ultimately, they want to sail to the Kimberley region. "That's what we are really excited about" Carolyn said.

Meanwhile they prepare by watching lots of sailing videos, doing courses and are taking their advanced PADI dive qualifications; the importance of which became apparent when their anchor got caught off Keswick Island once. 'It got wrapped around a bombie and we realised we would have to let the anchor go, but another Shagger friend, Gary Fry, was able to dive down and free it." Carolyn explained.

"We had a brilliant trip from Mackay Marina to Coral Sea Marina over 4 days in March, for our final delivery trip for Yaminda and we are counting down the days to her retirement in December (a). Then it is onwards to our nautical adventures ...]. Amazing wildlife sightings this trip - two gropers, a dugong, turtles, a bronze whaler and blacktip reef shark "Carolyn reports on her FB page.

Carolyn, (VC Ladysmith Islet), is soon to retire from Energy Qld (Ergon/Energex), and until recently was also busy writing the Seaforth community newsletter. John and Carolyn also volunteer in the Seaforth District Rural Fire Brigade.

It seems the two have learned the art of chilling, the next challenge: "We need to get better at fishing" says Carolyn. "It's definitely a learning adventure we're going on."

Keen Shaggers, they occasionally catch up with fellow members for the Friday night BBQ in Mackay and enjoy catching up with SICYC Vice Commodores passing through.

Bob the Dog



Lucky to be alive!

A (too) close encounter with a sting ray left Bob the Boat Dog on the verge of death. "He'd gone cold and there was blood pumping out of this hole in his chest" VC Yorkie's Knob, Alan Littlefield recalls with a shudder. "I was miles from any vet on a remote beach in North Queensland." But, luckily for Bob, Alan remembered his good friend's daughter was a vet - only she was in Africa! But thanks to modern communication she was able to talk Alan through what needed to be done to save his best buddy's life from thousands of miles away.

It wasn't the first dice with death for seven year old Bob, a Shitzu Poodle (Shitpoo). Alan rescued him six years ago. "We are now inseparable until one of us dies" he said. Since then things have been on the up for Bob who likes nothing better than to run up and down a beach chasing fish, even after the close encounter with the stingray.

But, as so many of you who have dogs onboard know, your 'best pal' can also be restrictive. Dogs aren't allowed in National Parks or Yacht Clubs. And it's vitally important Bob never learns to jump off the boat for a swim. "He'd swim ashore" Alan said, "and up north he wouldn't last long with the crocs."

Since Bob adopted Alan six years ago, they have cruised extensively up and down the Queensland Coast. Alan, originally a photocopy salesman from the UK, has been cruising for the past 20 years after an epiphany on Fitzroy Island. "I'd rented the resort for a staff appreciation trip and was lying in the sand looking at the stars and realised my career had cost too much in my personal life." He retired at 45 and went cruising, supplementing his income by working as a driving instructor for cars and motorbikes. "Its a great way to earn money when cruising, you can line up lessons for your next port of call."

Alan discovered sailing in 1989. "I was a keen windsurfer and saw people sailing on Sydney Harbour and decided to buy a Cole 23' "Stepping on board he thought: 'Christ! How big is this?' I thought it was the Queen Mary, I put the sails up on Sydney Harbour and thought 'what can possibly go wrong?'

With a wry smile his advice to those wanting to cruise is "Learn to sail first. You

won't believe how many people spend up to half a million on a boat and don't have the faintest idea what they are doing."

After the Cole 23' Alan tried his hand at building a 30' boat to do the Brisbane to Gladstone Race. "One of my more stupid ideas." He admits. "I'm a copy salesman not a boat builder." As the costs mounted, he stopped counting.

Over the years, and on different boats, he's participated in many races and rallies, including the Louisiades Rally from Cairns to Papua New Guinea (500 nm away) twice; competed three times in Race Weeks in Airlie Beach, Magnetic Island and Port Douglas, competed in the Brisbane Gladstone Race and took part regularly in the Cairns WAGS weekly races.

With his wry British sense of humour Alan recalls discussions on the 'arms debate' held with 'Merkins" (Americans). (As a wordsmith Alan enjoys entering the discussion, noting a 'Merkin' was a pubic wig worn by prostitutes in the 18thC.) So, the debate goes, 'What guns should you have onboard to go cruising?

Alan's reply is in this pic below: A 9mm, two clips and a box of shells.



Now cruising north for the season on his Bavaria 44 'Dreamagic' (someone left out an 'M'), Alan imagines he'll have another five years or so before cruising gets too arduous. Then he and Bob plan to head to Europe. "I'll wear a beret, drink red wine and buy a Porsche for Bob and I to cruise around in."

Meanwhile he shares his love of life on the water with people who want to experience the magic of cruising. A recent companion was a young soldier who was recovering from PTSD after serving in Afghanistan, who has now gone on to buy his own boat. Watching the sun go down, Alan plays Jimmy Buffet songs on his guitar, sips wine and fully appreciates his cruising lifestyle. And Bob, he just grins.





Meet Manta!

A sea-cleaning sailboat that feeds on plastic waste

We have watched the oceans fill with rubbish, now there is something that may be able to reverse some of the damage we have done over the past few years. So heartening, I wanted to share.

Each year, an estimated eight million tonnes of plastic end up in the ocean. According to the UN, if nothing is done, there will be more plastic waste than fish in the oceans by 2050.

Tired of hitting these floating objects during his races and seeing heavenly places turn into landfills, a French ocean adventurer Yvan Bourgnon decided to fight against this global scourge. He and his team have designed Manta, a giant, plastic-eating catamaran powered by renewable energy. The sea vessel literally scoops up plastic garbage and converts it into fuel to help power the boat.

Yvan Bourgnon – who has years of experience career racing sailing boats around the world's oceans – is the mastermind behind the venture. A steady increase in encounters with floating fields of garbage in the ocean inspired him to start the SeaCleaners project and build Manta, a 56-meter (184 foot) catamaran powered by a combination of advanced sail technology and electric motors.

The giant sailing boat will be the first of its kind capable of collecting, processing, and recovering large quantities of marine plastic waste. Built from low-carbon steel, the Manta features a custom electric hybrid propulsion system that allows maneuvering at low speed for sensitive operations (such as the entry to and exit from ports), as well as waste collections, which are carried out at 2 or 3 knots. Agile and energy-efficient, the Manta can reach a top speed of over 12 knots.

Around 500kW of onboard renewable energy is generated via two wind turbines, 500 square meters of photovoltaic solar panels, two hydro-generators under the boat, and a waste-to-energy conversion unit (WECU). The power supply from renewable energy sources will allow the Manta to operate 75% of the time autonomously, without using fossil fuels, and with minimal environmental footprint.

Thanks to a unique combination of collection means, the Manta will be able to pick up both floating macro-waste and smaller debris from 10 millimeters upwards and up to one meter deep. Depending on the density and closeness of the layers of waste, the ship can collect between 1 to 3 tonnes of waste per hour, with the objective of collecting 5 to 10,000 tonnes per year.

The Manta is the first self-sufficient workboat capable of processing 90 to 95% of the collected plastic waste whilst at sea. The waste-collecting conveyors – similar to the Ocean Cleanup project's third-generation Interceptor vessel system – bring the waste on board. A waste sorting unit manually separates the waste according to its type. A waste-to-energy conversion unit then converts the collected waste into electricity through the process of pyrolysis, which, in turn, powers all of the Manta's electrical equipment. This eco-friendly method emits hardly any CO2 or pollutants into the air.
